News from the Gym

From the Elks Gym Corner

The Elks gym rules and policies, which have been neglected far too long, are now being enforced on a regular basis. For some it's been a welcome pleasure, for others not so welcome. There are a number of factors why the rules need to be enforced. Several of these policies are set forth below along with an update on the gym's infrastructure and equipment.

The gym attendants must be treated with respect. The Elks Lodge has a ZERO tolerance rule against any aggressive behavior towards employees. If any member or guest is abusive to an employee they will be removed from the gym and suspended immediately from the Lodge and the gym facility. You must remember, the use of the gym is a privilege; you pay for the privilege to use the gym. This privilege can be revoked in perpetuity by the House Committee for "behavior unbecoming an Elk." We currently have two members that are on suspension for such behavior. It will not be tolerated!

The gym is not for individuals or just a few members. The gym is for the entire 550 gym members. For members who want to walk around without a shirt,

shoes, or shorts, for that matter – there are 500 members who are offended. The gym has come a long way in the past 20 years. The membership continually gets younger and the female membership continually increases. Be respectful of your fellow members.

The gym opens at 6:00 am during the week and 7:00 am, on Saturday and Sunday. The attendants arrive in a timely fashion so as to ready the facility, *i.e.*, turn on the lights, check the pool, turn on the steam room and make sure the facility is safe to enter. As such, members are not allowed to enter the gym when the attendant keys in, but must wait until the designated opening time and the gym attendant has unlocked the door. So, please give Ben a break and arrive for your workout at 6:01 am.

A two-towel policy was implemented because of theft and abuse. In case you haven't noticed, there is never a shortage of shorts – since only one pair can be worn at a time. The two-towel policy allows for control over the towel count and eliminates unnecessary wear and tear on the industrial washer and dryer. It is important to keep the equipment operating in order to avoid the situation earlier this year when the dryer went down for 24 hours. Additionally, the attendants were spending most of their shift doing laundry, when they should be upstairs manning the door and maintaining the facility.

Exalted Ruler's Column



For one week every July, Elks across the nation descend en masse upon a selected city for their annual Grand convention. I have been fortunate to participate in previous National Elks conventions, and I look forward to several wonderful presentations each time I go: namely, presentations and speeches honoring the young winners of the

National Hoop Shoot contest, and the winners of the National Scholarship contest.

The hoop shoot winners are younger... not yet in high school. They are nervous and thrilled to give their speeches, telling the crowd of thousands about what it took to win this intense event. This year's boy winner, for example, practiced for hours daily to become a dominant competitor, and by the final round of competition, had to win eight rounds of shoot-offs against another boy, after already tying him in the initial round. Counted altogether, it took 65 free throws to decide the winner. Can you imagine sinking 64 straight free-throws, and still losing? What an incredible competition!

Even more impressive to me are the tales of the scholarship winners, young teens who have already done so much with their lives, and who are getting a major boost in their academic pursuits from the Elks. The two top winners are each awarded a \$60,000 scholarship, and when you hear their stories, you realize just how hard they worked for it. This year, there was another unexpected delight, a young speaker whose story started out with her simple pledge to perform a good deed every day. She's the daughter of an Elk in Iowa named Maren McNees, and I recommend everyone Google her yourselves, to find out how much her simple pledge has inspired and impressed many others. It's heart-warming moments like these that make the best reminders of what we stand for in our Order.

When not in presentations and sessions, I spent a lot of time with Elks from all over the country, exchanging stories about lodge life, which is often quite different in other parts of the country (and often startlingly similar). Quite a few people remembered me and other San Francisco officers from the California State convention in May, and it was a mini-reunion to see these recent friends again. Others heard about us and the Bay District, and came to find out more about us a tour hospitality suite, which was dutifully managed by Ryan White, Christian Goodman, Tim O'Brien, and others in our lodge and district. Our energetic teamwork and friendliness brought us even more interest and contacts, which I have already seen turn into new friendships and support networks.

Another important activity at the National Convention was the installation of the new District Deputies, who will communicate directly with the Grand Exalted Ruler over the year to ensure that our local lodges are thriving and running smoothly. Lynn Glick, the incoming Bay District Deputy from Alameda, will be visiting our Lodge on September 1, so it's already time to start getting ready for this important inspection!

With the National Convention now behind me, I want to turn my focus toward our lodge's committees, to start building even more energy toward key areas of success. I've collected a bunch of new ideas for our Public Relations, Lodge Activities, and Communications (bulletin, social media, e-mail blasts, etc.), and I wanted to formally invite anyone interested in jumping on board these committees to contact me about getting involved.

Although things may be a bit quieter on the lodge front in August, I am very excited about a wonderful personal milestone rapidly coming up mid-month: my wedding ceremony with my lovely First Lady, Sanae! I have had so much happiness with my bride-to-be, and I will be so proud to be her husband. Sanae, thank you for so much! The best is yet to come!

Finally, thanks to all of our members for your continual shows of warmth and support. San Francisco Lodge #3 raised \$3,000 to donate to Joplin, Missouri Lodge #501 to assist their members with recovering from the deadly tornado that struck their town in late May. You do us proud – Thanks for showing our struggling brothers the heart of Elkdom!

The reception counter has become a new focal point and a meeting area for gym members. An attendant is now at the reception counter to greet the members, enforce the sign in sheet for members and their guests, collect guest fees, and assist the members as necessary. The sign in/out sheets are now mandatory and serve three purposes: (1) to identify who is in the facility in case of an emergency; (2) to reflect how many people are using the gym for staffing purposes; and (3) to confirm whether or not a member's dues are current. We have historically offered a grace period for unpaid membership/gym dues, however, your access to the gym will be denied after the semi-annual due date. The gym attendants have the right to enforce this policy. In fairness to all gym members, pay your dues on time, April 1st and October 1st. Please remember, Elk members are required to have their membership card with them when entering the San Francisco Elks Lodge, which includes the gym.

The steam room is the only steam room of it's kind in America – *or so we believe!* The majority of steam rooms operate with a steam generator; however, our steam room runs on a steam boiler. The members have the ability to have “steam on demand,” by turning the timer on and off. Not many other clubs allow that option. Gary Darling, a MLB professional umpire and guest of Elk member Tom Kent, told me that he has not found another steam room that compares to the SF Elks. The downside to this is that the boiler cannot always keep up with the demand. Overuse lowers the water level in the boiler and causes the boiler to shutdown. The attendants know how to remedy this issue; however, to avoid unnecessary damage to the boiler, please turn on the timer only while you are using the steam room. The cost of the new boiler was \$25k. The steam room was rebuilt, from the studs up to new tile at a cost of \$25k. The Lodge could have opted for a steam generator to save money, but decided against it. The quarterly service contract on the boiler is \$2,800 a year. So, the next time you see the steam running with no one in it, please turn it off.

The hot room is also fed from the steam boiler. The Lodge just spent \$3,500 to replace five steam traps, a new pipe from the basement to the hot room, and two new on/off valves. The hot room is also “heat on demand.” The members can turn the valves on off when they like. The hot room has never worked better.

The swimming pool is the most costly item in the gym. Just this past year it was necessary to replace and upgrade major components in the filtration system along with the main circuit board in the pool pilot box, upgrade the motherboard in the controller and install a new chlorinator. The total cost for parts and labor was over \$10k. The lights on the columns surrounding the pool,

which were rusted and decayed, were restored while the gym was closed to repair the ceiling leak.

The gym was closed for demolition work on the ceiling to identify and repair a leaking pipe. It was necessary to close the facility because the work could not have been undertaken without disrupting the gym members. A 35-foot section of pipe was replaced. The ceiling has not been repaired because a water test, conducted on the sidewalk at street level, determined that the membrane under the sidewalk is compromised. When it rains, water is making its way into the gym. Once this issue is addressed the ceiling in the gym will be repaired.

Next year the Lodge will be in a better position to make equipment upgrades to the cardio room and weight room. Also, please attend Lodge Meetings. At Lodge meetings members can make motions and vote. If a gym issue needs to be addressed at the House Committee, check with Leading Knight Eric Wright. He prepares the House Committee agenda and will be happy to discuss your issues with you. If after discussing the issue with Eric you feel you need to address the House Committee, Eric will make room for you on the House Committee agenda. By getting involved, we can all make a difference in our Lodge. The HC welcomes the ideas and suggestions of Members for the better good of the gym and the Elks Lodge.

The gym facility is ours, we need to protect it, be proud of it, keep it special, and police it while there. We all know – it's the best-kept secret in San Francisco!

1. Shirts, shoes and proper dress attire must be worn in all public areas.
2. All members and guests MUST sign in and out at the door upon every visit.
3. There is a two-towel limit for ALL members and guests

5. All guests must be accompanied by an Elk. All guests over the age of 16 are responsible for paying guest fees.
6. Gym Guest Passes should be presented at time of sign-in.

9. Access to the facilities will be suspended after one month of unpaid dues.

Grand Lodge Resolutions

Grand Lodge, in Phoenix, deliberated many resolutions. As per our Grand Lodge Statutes, those issues and their outcomes are listed here.

1. To eliminate the requirement that Lodge officers memorize. Pass
2. To allow the use of alternate Rituals approved by Grand Lodge. Pass
3. To allow the posting of candidates' names prior to voting. Yes 1593 No 1603
4. To transfer the duties of the Grand Treasurer to the Grand Secretary. Pass
5. To allow a reward for recruiting and retaining members. Pass.
6. To remove references to the Communist Part and include all organizations advocating the violent or forcible overthrow of the government. Pass.
7. To delete Grand Lodge committees and create a new Activities Committee. Pass
8. To delete Grand Lodge committees and create a new Fraternal committee. Pass
9. To conform the subordinate lodges' committees and programs to those of Grand Lodge. Pass
10. To replace the word "Subordinate" with the word "Local" throughout the Constitution and Laws of the Order. Pass.
11. To delete the requirement of a January District Deputy clinic. Pass.
12. To provide for lowest regularly available coach fares rather than first class for travel. Pass.
13. To delete the requirement that District Deputies attend the Grand Lodge session. Fail.
14. To delete the requirement that District Deputies witness and report on the Lodge's exemplification of the Initiatory Ritual. Pass
15. To replace the word "Grand" with the word "National" throughout the Constitution and the statutes enacted by Grand Lodge. Fail
16. To delete positions, add two new positions, and provide for a new method of selecting the Grand Exalted Ruler. Fail.
17. To provide for the Grand Vice-President to become the Grand Exalted Ruler automatically. Fail
18. To streamline and restructure the committees of the Grand Lodge. Pass (Requires passage of 7 & 8) Pass
19. To allow subordinate Lodges to have only one meeting per month. Pass
20. To conform the statute to one meeting per month. Fail (If 15 or 21 fail, this is void)
21. To conform the statute to one meeting per month. Fail (If 19 or 20 fail, this is void)
22. To allow Homes, Clubs, Club Rooms, and Social Parlors to be open during Lodge meetings. Fail
23. To allow the assets of defunct Lodges to be split between a state major project and a state association. Pass
24. To eliminate mandatory funding for the Elks Nation Home. Pass
25. To allow guest access cards for military personnel (declared out of order)
26. To clarify that "charge" means a formal complaint in a Subordinate Forum. Pass
27. To allow Subordinate Lodges to recognize affiliated organizations. Pass
28. To establish provisions relating to affiliated organizations. Pass (depended on 27 to pass) Pass
29. To increase the fee for replacing lost or destroyed Lodge Charters. Pass
30. To establish a uniform master Lodge auditing and accounting program. Fail
31. To allow the State Sponsor to waive the requirements for an audit, review, or compilation. Pass
32. To allow the State Sponsor to waive professional preparation of Lodge tax returns. Pass
33. To clarify that a Board of Directors, made up of the Chair Officers and Trustees, shall govern incorporated Lodges. Pass
34. To modify the duties of the Grand Secretary in making disbursements. Pass
35. To permit the Committee on Judiciary to make non-substantive, conforming changes to the Laws of the Order. Pass
36. To permit the electronic transmittal of the Elks Magazine. Pass

DAVID R. CARR

GRAND EXALTED RULER 2011-2012



David was born and raised in the Village of Port Henry, a hamlet in the town of Moriah, New York. Following his high school graduation in 1960, he successfully completed a four-year New York State accredited Industrial Electronics Apprenticeship training course in addition to several college-level courses and seminars in business, advanced writing, advanced math, computerized electronic control systems, power distribution and controls, labor-management auditing and finance, workplace health and safety, and IRS and State Attorney General Tax Exempt Charities Symposiums. David spent his thirty-seven-year career in industrial electronics and safety and retired from International Paper in Ticonderoga, New York, in 1999.

David was initiated into Whitehall, New York Lodge No. 1491 in February 1975. He immediately became active with the Youth Activities Committee and served as the Lodge Organist and Chaplain. He transferred his membership to the Ticonderoga, New York Lodge after moving to nearby Crown Point in 1978. Here, he served as Lodge Chaplain, Esquire, and Organist and was active on many committees and fundraising activities. He proceeded through the chairs and served as Exalted Ruler in 1989, PER Association Chairman in 1990, and Lodge Trustee from 1988 to 2005. He served as Lodge Editor and Public Relations Chairman from 1988 to 2004 and was District Editor and Public Relations Chairman from 1993 to 1996.

David served the New York State Elks Association as State Vice President in 1990– 1991, as Community Activities Chairman from

the Dictionary Project to the New York State Elks Association in September 2003.

David served the Grand Lodge as District Deputy in 1994–1995, as a member of a Grand Lodge Steering Committee, as Trustee Chairman overseeing the financial assets of a defunct Lodge from 2002 to 2010, and as a member of the Board of Grand Trustees from 2006 to 2010. He introduced the Dictionary Project to the Grand Lodge in July 2004.

David has served as a member or officer of several conservation organizations and has served on the hospital board, school board, and board of fire commissioners. He is also a member of the volunteer fire company, Kiwanis Club, Knights of Columbus, Jaycees, US Coast Guard auxiliary, and is a founding member of the Department of

Homeland Security. In 2008, David was awarded President Bush's USA Freedom Corps Volunteer Service Award by then GER Paul Helsel.

David and his wife, Penny, have four children: David, who lives in Skiatook, Oklahoma, with his wife, Kim, and son

She began her first fraternal association with Job's Daughters where she served as Honored Queen in 1977.

Lynn was initiated into Alameda Lodge No. 1015 in 1997 as the third female member of the Lodge. She has served on several Lodge committees including House, Budget and Membership. Lynn became the Lodge's first female officer in 1999, and served as its first female Exalted Ruler, and as one of the first two in the Bay District, in 2001-02. Lynn has since served as Chair of the District Elks Training Committee, and for several years as Chair of the District Ritual Contest Committee. She also served as State Vice President in 2009-2010 under State President Leon Karjola.

After graduating from high school in Sioux Falls, Lynn followed her older brother to California and enrolled in Sonoma State University, graduating with a B.A. in Linguistics in 1983. She then moved to Honolulu, where she attended the University of Hawaii, receiving her M.A. in Linguistics, with a specialization in English as a Second Language, in 1985. Lynn returned to Sonoma State and completed the teacher credential program in 1987. Since then she has worked for the Oakland Unified School District, as a classroom teacher, a Teacher on Special Assignment in the Office of Bilingual Education, and reading coach. She currently teaches second grade. Lynn has served on several area and statewide education committees and projects, and has done presentations at national education conventions.

Lynn and her husband Jeff, whom she initiated as an Elk during her term as Exalted Ruler, have been married for 18 years, and live in Oakland with their ten-year-old daughter Elissa.
